## Please Welcome Andrew Noone, Author Bathsheba Spooner: A Revolutionary Murder Conspiracy



What possessed a woman from the elite society of eighteenth-century New England to conspire with an American soldier and two British run-away soldiers to murder her husband at the midpoint of the American Revolution? The story of Bathsheba Spooner (1746-1778) is the most sensational "true crime" tragedy of the American 1700s. She was the first woman in American history to be executed following the Declaration of Independence. She was just 32 years old and her penalty for "inciting, abetting and procuring the manner and form of murder" was death by hanging. Along with her three conspirators, this was carried out in Worcester's Washington Square before a crowd of

5,000 spectators on July 2, 1778.

**Andrew Noone** became interested in Spooner when he realized that his house was adjacent to Green Hill Park in Worcester where Spooner was buried in an unmarked grave with her five-month-old unborn son. He became fascinated with the story, and began to research the murder and trial.

Noone is an independent scholar with graduate degrees in art history and musicology from Syracuse University. He has been music specialist in the Worcester Public Schools and has taught dozens of college courses in the humanities at several colleges in Massachusetts, including Clark University, where he taught ESL and received a graduate certificate in TESOL (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages). He completed three years of study in the Keepers of the Republic program (in American history), hosted by the American Antiquarian Society. He has published with Worldwide Books and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Previously a member of the Worcester Historical Commission, he is currently a docent for Preservation Worcester.

## After You're Gone: Future Proofing Your Genealogy with Thomas MacEntee

The Society enjoyed a presentation by genealogist Thomas MacEntee on the topic of what to do with one's genealogy when no longer around. The problem centers on finding someone or something to inherit your research. The preservation of videos, tape recordings, books, paper manuscripts, paper items, and even an old wedding dress are specific examples.

A digital footprint is left on our participation in social media. A codicil in a will can specify the disposition of genealogical research and data which otherwise no one would want to inherit and would be thrown out because of its doubtful value to anyone else.

Some specific preparations, including adding labels on items such as photographs; making a plan; treating your research as an INVESTMENT (total up the money that you spend annually on genealogical research); and writing up biographical sketches of individual ancestors as a summation of what has been learned.

A first major step is getting organized, such as color-coding information according to different family groups. Janine Adams' book, *Organize Your Family History*, and Myrtle's *The Organized Genealogist* on Facebook, are two good resources. A second step is taking a full inventory of what is on paper, digital, and book forms. Books can be donated, digital items can be included in data bases, and some browsers have ways to designate a successor user.

Further recommendations are talking to family members in advance to find out who may be interested in inheriting your genealogy and communicating personal wishes about what to do with it.

A number of major repositories may be interested in one's data, but it is important to include in your will a donation to go with the data because repositories have expenses in order to process and organize the data when they receive them; a suggested amount would be \$100 per linear foot of material being donated.

Some examples of organizations that may be interested in personal data in some form would be: Newberry Library in Chicago, the Fort Wayne (IN) Library, the New England Historic Genealogical Society, Salt Lake City Family History Library (if the material is in boxes), Pritzker Military Library in Chicago, local historical societies if the information relates to historical figures from that community, the New York Public Library, the Godfrey Library in Connecticut, a genealogical society, a museum if the data relates to the provenance of an item held at that museum, and a university library if the data is focused on someone who had been connected with that university.

Some aspects of technology can be useful in preparing data for inheritance. These include scanners for photographic negatives and other items. Reviewing possible items for purchase can be done at Best Buy, but the best prices seem to be available via Amazon.

To summarize possible steps, remember to do the following:

- Get organized
- -Take inventory
- Include the process in one's estate planning
- Back up data, especially to the Cloud
- Talk with family members about your wishes
- Contact the organization to which one wishes to donate
- Prescribe a donation to be made to whatever facilities

you wish to designate as recipients, and put that designation in your will

- Post some items online which you wish to give to unidentified individuals
